History and Background

- EC3 was incorporated in November 2012, as the signature recommendation of the Peterborough Municipal Cultural Plan (2012)
- Consultations with more than 700 community members flagged the need for a singular, arm's-length municipal arts, culture and heritage council to develop and deliver programming and services that foster organizational development, build capacity in and advance the sector, build opportunities for professional artists, connect and convene community members, and to advocate in behalf of the ACH sector to governments and across other constituencies.

History and Background

- In 2014, EC3 received a three-year Trillium Seed grant to complement its City operating funding, stabilized its Board, and launched a robust program of activities and services. At the request of the City, EC3 took on responsibility for Artsweek
- In 2016, EC3 hired an Executive Director, and over the past five years has raised an additional \$500,000 for new investments in the arts community.

Who We Are

The Electric City Culture Council (EC3) is an independent, arm's length, not-for-profit arts service organization, creating and delivering programs and services that strengthen the development and advancement of the arts, culture and heritage (ACH) sector in Peterborough and the surrounding region (Peterborough County).

We champion the arts so more artists can make work for more audiences!

Our Mission

Our mission is to build capacity across the sector by providing a range of programs and services that enable individual artists and ACH professionals and organizations to advance their practice, acquire new skills, share knowledge, decrease precarity, increase sustainability, and work together more effectively and efficiently while building new audiences. EC3 provides informed advocacy and strategic leadership for the ACH community.

Our Job

- Act as an advocacy body supporting, communicating, and reflecting the needs of arts organizations
- Act as an antenna and sounding board for the interests and concerns of the ACH community
- Identify challenges in the sector, and develop and deliver programs and services that help our members and the broader creative community meet those challenges.



Our Job

- Discover new opportunities for artists, implement useful and innovative strategies to strengthen organizations, and provide meaningful support to better serve artists, heritage professionals, cultural managers, and audiences
- Build audiences, make great cultural experiences more accessible, and amplify the impact of arts, culture, and heritage activity.

What We Do

We (normally) deliver approximately 12 programs and services for individual artists, cultural professionals, arts organizations, heritages groups, and the boarder cultural sector:

- Deliver an **award program** with cash prizes to honour and acknowledge outstanding artists and build recognition of local creators, arts supporters, and cultural professionals
- Provide paid artist residencies and mentorships
- Create **new opportunities** for artists to learn, create and present their work
- Produce arts awareness initiatives to build audiences and increase sponsorships
- Create and deliver **commission**, **bursary**, and **grant programs**

What We Do

- Provide new forums for exploring critical ideas, important issues, and creative innovations, and to transfer that knowledge to decision makers
- Deliver professional development for individuals and organizations (workshops, mentorships, consultations, coaching)
- Bring people together: dedicated sector coordinating, connecting, and convening
- Organize and deliver advocacy, strategic leadership, and informed representation
- Conduct original research, gather knowledge, and share information about the needs and impact/contributions of the local ACH sector and the national scene
- Respond to inclusion, accessibility, anti-racism, and cultural diversity issues

- Develop **networking**, **collaborations**, and **partnerships** that build and strengthen the capacity of the arts, culture and heritage community, across and between other sectors
- Provide direct **support services** for arts and heritage organizations (FUZE)

- Respond rapidly and creatively to **global pandemics** and other **Acts of God**



- It's been quite a year
- January: EC3 completed advocacy work to restore the organization's annual operating grant that had somehow been lost in the budgeting process for 2020 due to staff changeover at City Hall
- Advocacy work with City Council on maintaining Service Grants and Community Investment and Project Grants in the 2020 budget was a top priority and required considerable time and energy
- The City asked EC3 to postpone the launch of the Poet Laureate Pilot Program, making it challenging to reschedule and to deliver the program in this fiscal year
- EC3 launched into our usual frenzied round of grant applications in late January and February: DBIA, Canadian Heritage, Canada Summer Jobs and OAC.

- We were grateful to have outstanding administrative, research, and programming support from Gabe Pollock and Kerith Paul
- Executive Director Su Ditta was appointed Co-Chair of the newly formed Alliance of Ontario Arts Councils, and continued her work with ACHAC, the Chamber of Commerce, Peterborough DBIA, Maryam Monsef's Office, etc.
- CBC radio documentary on our Art and Addiction event was broadcast, and program planning for 2020/2021 including Artsweek and Arts Awards began
- In mid-March, COVID-19 hit and all planning was reviewed and redirected as EC3 shifted gears to provide support, develop and deliver response and relief programs for individual artists and arts and heritage organizations in the sector.

- Gabe Pollock came on board as a permanent staff member to make our robust COVID-19 response possible
- EC3's financial reserve was put to good use, supporting COVID-19 initiatives, but we will rebuild it
- Over the past 5 years, EC3 has brought \$450,000 of new money to the table for the ACH sector
- Thanks to Peterborough Performing Arts Recovery Alliance on all their hard and excellent work on advocacy, and on fundraising for the Peterborough Arts Alive Fund, which will top \$100,0000.

- We are very proud of what EC3 has been able to do in the past nine months, and very grateful to all the artists and curators, board members, and community stakeholders that made it all possible
- Our heartfelt thanks go out to the City of Peterborough, to the many City Councilors who have encouraged and supported us, and to all our funders and sponsors who you will see recognized in our Annual Report coming up
- EC3 worked very hard and very quickly to adapt programs and budgets to the challenges and demands of the COVID-19 pandemic crisis, as you will see in our upcoming report on the Peterborough Arts Alive suite of recovery and response initiatives.




COVID-19: THE PIVOT

Responding to the COVID-19 pandemic, EC3 postponed several projects, including Artsweek 2020 and the 2020 Peterborough Arts Awards, dramatically shifting our work to meet the community's acute pandemic needs.



COVID-19: THE PIVOT

We immediately launched the **Peterborough Arts Alive** suite of COVID-19 response and recovery initiatives, including micro-grants, special arts programming, arts awareness campaigns, digital skills training, impact research, leadership roundtables, targeted advocacy, information gathering, and knowledge sharing.



So, we commit EC3, along with so many of our colleagues, to doing just that. Please learn more and support causes that matter.





Pivot, shift, rethink, switch and keep going

Local artists and arts organizations get creative and adapt to COVID-19

Peterboroughhas always had a wealth of artists and arts organizations to provide us with a rich and inspiring cultural life. Maybe it's because we are far enough from the 401 corridor that we need to "make our own fun," or maybe it is our history as a "frontier" town, or it's the cascading waters that ripple through our beautiful landscape that provide inspiration for creativity and innovation. The COVID-19 pandemic, and ensuing lockdown, put a dam along those creative waterways, as venues and galleries were shuttered, and most opportunities for artists to present or exhibit work in-person were cut off. Many of these barriers remain in place, as ever-evolving public health restrictions and limits on social gathering sizes make it difficult for traditional arts and culture events to take place, and audiences remain unsure about returning to large gatherings. But the spirit of creativity and innovation of Peterborough's artists and arts organizations was not dampened by the pandemic, and many have found unusual, unexpected, and often highly successful ways of 'pivoting,' presenting work in new forms and in new spaces. 

- Organized 2 roundtables with Hon. Maryam Monsef, MP and follow-up.



Advocacy: Provincial

 EC3 Executive Director Su Ditta is Co-Chair of the newly formed Alliance of Arts Councils of Ontario and served on the task force that developed a presentation to The Ontario Standing Committee on Finance and Economic Affairs, in response to the provincial government's COVID-19 Economic Update. This was a written delegation submitted to Queen's Park on July 6, 2020.



Advocacy: Provincial

- Ditta also researched, prepared and presented a standalone submission from EC3
- To date, attempts to get a meeting with MPP Dave Smith have been unsuccessful
- Ongoing work with the AACO to ensure Peterborough arts organizations such as Market Hall and Showplace would be eligible in new COVID-19 OAC programs
- New talks planned with local tourism folks.



Advocacy: Municipal

- Successfully advocated to have all ACH groups eligible for Chamber of Commerce and DBIA online programs
- Successfully advocated for "comfort conditions" letter to go out with all Service and CIPG announcements
- Rent deferral and waiver negotiations

Governance and Board Recruitment


Each year, EC3:

- Canvasses our existing board, and reviews the terms of their appointments, identifying upcoming gaps
- Undertakes a demographic, knowledge, and skills needs assessment to determine what kinds of new board members are needed.



Governance and Board Recruitment

- The Governance Committee undertakes strategic recruitment helping us build a shortlist of potential new members
- Based on our analysis of the current board membership and an assessment of our future needs, a shortlist of potential board members is developed by the Governance Committee and approved by the current Board of Directors.



Governance and Board Recruitment

- The Executive Director, the Board Chair and other Board members as required, begin the recruitment process by interviewing and recommending shortlisted nominees
- Shortlisted nominees are approved by the board and an invitation is sent
- New board members are approved by the board and presented at the AGM for ratification.






